Popular former Maple Leaf Brad Marsh has joined the Road Hockey To Conquer Cancer team!

Brad Marsh was such a stand-out defenceman in junior that his club, the London Knights, retired his jersey number and he was entered into the London Sports Hall of Fame. He began his NHL odyssey of more than 1,000 games by joining the Atlanta Flames, moving with the franchise to Calgary. While with the Philadelphia Flyers, Brad went to the Stanley Cup final in 1985 and 1987. He later joined the Leafs, where his enthusiasm for the game made him a favourite. After playing a season-and-a-half with Detroit, he concluded his NHL career with the Ottawa

Senators in 1993, and was asked to participate in the NHL All-Star Game that season as a nod to his stellar career. Brad was one of the last players to go helmet-less through his career. Last year, at the age of 54, Brad cycled across Canada as a fundraiser for the Boys and Girls Club. "It was such a great sense of accomplishment going from coast to coast," he said. "As I rode across Canada, I would stop at a Boys and Girls Club, get off my bike and play road hockey with them, so that was a real hoot."
